2.	 Ed moving to Durham Uni in September; reflecting on where we've been. 'You may be at the summit, but that's essentially halfway.' His 'end of road' at Aberdeen University has been well documentedlanguages constantly under scrutiny in a way that e.g. other subjects are not. The shock of likely redundancy did at least produce a lot of welcome support from the wider languages community. It reminded us of the community spirit in ML teaching at all levels and focussed understanding on the value of what we all do. And in fact, the University backed away from its 'slash & burn' plans. Others said they had never before seen the power of response in similar situations. And the thought is that the University did more damage to itself & its own reputation. So – where are we now? Languages is in a challenging place – when is it not? Trends: steep declines in French & German; Spanish, Chinese a bit more encouraging. And maybe things are beginning to stabilise. Language Explorers Scotland (university mentoring programme). National Rollout Year 1: 14 schools from 10 authorities, working with 5 universities. Demonstrating the power of networking in the ML community in Scotland. Modelled in Aberdeenshire on something piloted by Cardiff Universitybut without the budget. Then Covid stopped everythingor seemed to. Then SCILT agreed to get involved. There was a pilot in Aberdeenshire last year: 5 schools, 10 mentors; distribution from Thurso to Ayr. Please encourage more people to get involved for Year 2. Interventions in \$2/3 are key. Sometimes it's sowing seeds for Uni. Sessions are more about what it means to be multilingual, rather than grammar, vocab etc. There has been encouraging feedback from mentees. More info on SCILT website.

To sum up: collaboration, partnership, resilience, optimism. And remember there's nothing like LANGS, or SCILT, south of the border (of the same quality
anyway). Resilience: it can be hard not to feel defeated, but we may be
stronger than we think. Optimism: remember the means, tools at our
disposal.

Education Scotland update, Louise Glen

- Curriculum Improvement Cycle: OECD have published recommendations to update various aspects since CfE was set up 16 or 17 years ago...but without the 5-14 → CfE seismic shock.
- Is there too much focus on skills, rather than knowledge? We need to improve PISA results. Reviewing: Curriculum Specialists (secondary practitioners), prioritisation (grammar!).
- Deprioritisation, clutter & coherence of curriculum (what we can we take out).
- Parameters for review capacities and big ideas (the most exciting bit: what do learners need to be able to do to show what they've learned). Central tenets stay. Four capacities stay, e.g. but looking at did we ever properly address attainment barriers, transition Primary → Secondary, BGE → Senior Phase, progression, moderation, tracking & monitoring...?
- **BUT** don't reinvent your own wheels...material will be published shortly on, for example:
 - Observations, themes & 'tensions': (teachers want clarity and flexibility, but not prescription; & more guidance. Somewhat difficult to balance!)
 - Aiming for less discrepancy across schools and LAs re time allocation for languages. This has caused massive inequity.
- What is 'missing' from present ML curriculum? For example, prescribed topics, grammar progression, exemplification of levels; clarity e.g. what a 'short conversation' means; the old question, should levels be linked to CEFR? Joe Carson, St Andrews University and past Chair of UCMLS always said Scotland doesn't stand up very well on that measure. [Ed Welch: some of the CEFR descriptors are helpful]. Baby not being thrown out with bathwater. Learning & Teaching events portal...ES will work with departments, schools, clusters, authorities...please get in touch!

Handover to new Chairs:

- a) Robbie Kirk, PT MFL at Chryston HS (new Co-chair): it's good to be continuing/developing the model of actual practising teachers chairing LANGS. And there's a good spread of LAs represented in the chairs. LANGS is possibly a uniquely supportive group...but as a discipline, it is under chronic attack like no other. Need to address disconnects...e.g. Strathclyde University, one of the best engineering departments doesn't offer German. And University of Aberdeen has already been under discussion this morning. And Brexit...not just no funding, but visa difficulties as well.
- b) Laura Morris, Faculty Head at Mintlaw Academy (Co-chair): LANGS gives the opportunity to appreciate the bigger picture outside one's own LA silo. Equity. Expanded horizons; We need more work on curriculum to make it accessible for those with dyslexia etc. But expanding cultural awareness is equally important. KHG: why are languages perceived as difficult? Ans: historic reasons; in many communities people don't go abroad much, so don't see the value. But we can contribute to all aspects of literacy...perhaps particularly in communities where there's little grasp of it. We start from the ground up. Literacy can still quite a barrier to all aspects of the curriculum.
- c) **Joanna Paterson**, East Renfrewshire, finishing as PT Langs and some central MFL support (Vice Chair): Playing with words, language, broadening horizons, cultural curiosity is my thing. Initially Primary trained. Wish to see LANGS as a collective voice to address SG etc. About to take on a P3 class. Class say they want a 'country corner' to learn about other countries. Gives you hope! Population changes bring a wider collection of L1s.
