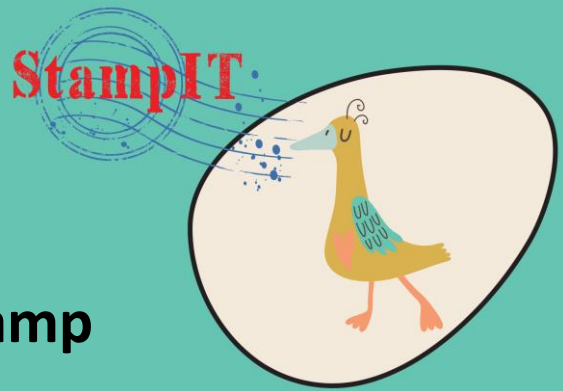


## ‘The Story of a Spanish Stamp’

Take any Spanish stamp and find out the following information:

- when the stamp was issued;
- why the stamp was issued;
- the name of the person, place, object or animal on the stamp;
- information about the person, place, object or animal;
- create an artistic A4 page which includes the above information.





## How to find out about a stamp

The best place to start is to look at the stamp with a magnifying glass. Sometimes the year of issue and other information is printed on the stamp.

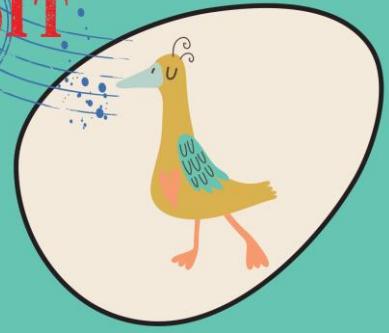
Look up the stamp in a stamp catalogue (available online and in libraries). The catalogue will inform you of when and why the stamp was issued. The catalogue will also have the name of the person, place, object or animal on the stamp.

Research information using books or websites to find out more about the person, place, object or animal (always check the information is from a reliable source).



The stamp was issued in Spain but the year of issue is not on the stamp. However the words '*1<sup>st</sup> Centenario Instituto Geografico y Catastral*' appear on the stamp which translates to 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Geographical and Statistical Institute. A quick online search provided an article on the history of the institute which started in 1870. Therefore the stamp was issued in 1970.





# Create an artistic page using your stamp and information.

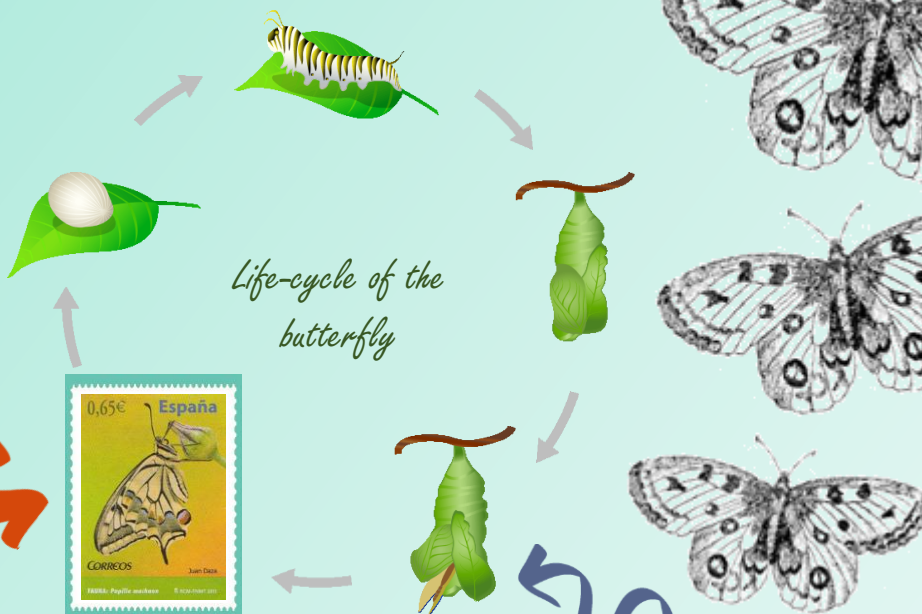
Example page

Give the page a title.

## Butterflies

This stamp was issued in 2011 as part of a set of butterfly stamps. The butterfly shown on the stamp is the *Papilio machaon* with the common name of yellow swallowtail. It is found across Europe, Asia, in the north of Africa and North America. It is common in Spain but only found in a few areas in the UK, mainly in the Norfolk Broads.

The Spanish word for the butterfly is *la mariposa*.



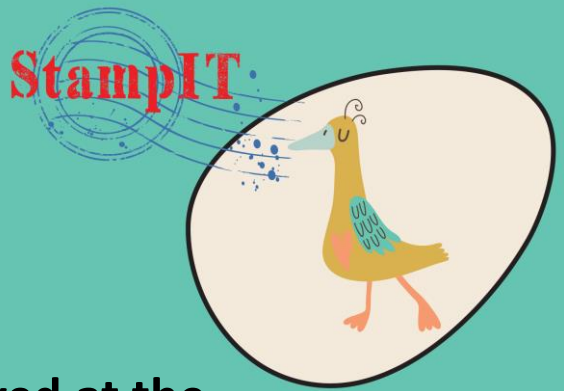

Type or write the information.

Draw, use stickers or rubber stamps etc. to decorate.

Stick stamp in a suitable place on page. If possible use stamp hinge to attach.

Draw or find pictures to use in diagrams (check copyright of the pictures and make sure you are allowed to use).
