





## Activities: Reading

- Culture: Research aspects of that culture revealed in the film and present them in some form.
- Synonyms: Choose 10 words from the film and ask the class to find synonyms.
- **Translation:** Choose a speech or section of dialogue from the film and transcribe it. Ask pupils to translate this or answer questions on it.
- Film reading: Teach the names of camera shots in your chosen language. Ask them to find words to describe certain shots (e.g. intense, isolating, energetic...)
- **Quote posters:** Translate a favourite film quote into a lovely poster.

## Activities: Writing



- Storyboarding: Create a storyboard in another language for a film you love, or that continues a foreign language film you've watched, or for your own foreign language film!
- Film Review: Write a film review in your chosen language.
- Character writing: Choose a character from the film and write a diary entry, postcard, email, text message as them.
- Draw and Annotate: Pupils draw a character from the film and surround it with words to describe their personality/actions. (Also works for describing a setting.)

# Activities: Talking



- Questioning: Show a film clip and ask pupils understanding questions in your chosen language.
- Drama: Get pupils to act out an additional scene for the film in that language.
- **Trailer:** Use the iMovie Trailer template to make a foreign film trailer.
- **Commentary:** Pupils film an activity and add a commentary in their chosen language.
- Filmmaking: Make a film for the SEET Our World filmmaking competition.

# Activities: Listening

- Vocabulary Bingo: Make bingo sheets with key vocabulary from the film and have pupils mark off the words while watching.
- Sound On/Vision Off: Show a short film or clip with the picture off. What have they
  understood about what is happening? Show it again with the picture on to see how
  accurate they were.
- Quiz: Pupils make a multiple choice quiz on a given section of the film and test each other.
- Film as Teacher: Ask pupils to watch a film in a language they don't know and make a list of 10 key words they learn from it.
