A guide to opportunities for young people and young adults

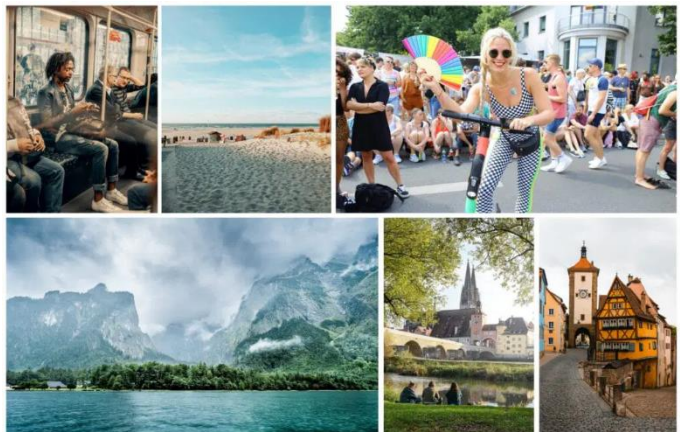
